

Bari Logan has 33 years practical experience in the preparation of human anatomical material for both preclinical and postgraduate medical studies, museum display and research with direct clinical relevance.

He began his career as Anatomical Preparator in 1972 at Nottingham University in the newly developing Queen's Medical School; then in 1977 moved to London where he took-up the academic post of Prosector to the Department of Anatomy, Royal College of Surgeons, of England under the Professorship of R.M.H. McMinn. A final career move, in 1987, took him to the University of Cambridge, as University Prosector to the Anatomy Department, where part of his duties was to re-develop and oversee the day-to-day running of a busy undergraduate dissecting room facility; he retired in 2005. He has co-authored/authored ten major books on the subject of Human Anatomy which have produced over 63 foreign editions in 17 different languages. During his career has gained numerous professional qualifications and awards in recognition for his work and was elected a member of Clare College Cambridge in 1995.
